

Second Sunday in Ordinary Time January 18, 2026

John 1:29-34

Recently I've been reflecting on what it might be like to be in the physical presence of the one we call Lord, Savior, Messiah: Jesus. Reading this gospel passage regarding John the Baptist proclaiming, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world..." I can't help but wonder if this holy Lamb was really to John the seemingly unapproachable God-Man, upon whose head a dove descends.

Rather, my imagination takes me to another place entirely. I think John, Jesus' cousin, who likely grew up with him and who together went through all the ordinary stages of infancy, childhood, and awkward adolescence, looked emotionally at Jesus as his intimate relative and BFF. John, having already risked so much as a Zealot-type contrarian to the Jewish-Roman empire he was immersed in, would have perceived Jesus as his beloved lifelong soulmate and supporter. I can imagine John, startled to see Jesus coming forward in the line to be baptized, exploding with astonished joy that caused his spirit to soar like the Dove. After all, Jesus, his most cherished friend, came in person to affirm John's actions and to humbly request baptism for himself! This Jesus (of my imagination) I can completely embrace as understanding all the vulnerabilities of love and transparency before others. Like John, he is someone who completely "gets" what it is to stand up to the Empire as a misfit and a contrarian. He too is someone who is also unconditionally loving toward everyone around him, including all the "sinners" lined up at the Jordan River.

On Christmas morning I happened to go to Mass at Dolores Mission, a hispanic Jesuit parish in the inner city of Los Angeles, where my daughter (an L.A. Catholic Worker) attends regularly. That morning we had the

good fortune of going to a Mass presided by Greg Boyle, S.J. Coincidentally, this happy accident was timed with my reading his latest book, *Cherished Belonging*. Like the book, filled with delightful stories of encounters with his formerly outcast "homeys," Fr. Greg preached the most down-to-earth homily on what it is to be in relationship with God. In his book he frequently quotes the Mystics, including prophet and priest, Meister Eckhart. Eckhart was condemned by the Church in 1328 for contradicting its image of "the distant and aloof 'Unapproachable God,' with his own version of God who "wants to approach us, remind us of our goodness, and access us" taking us by the hand. This is Fr. Greg's image of God.

This is the same God that I've come to know in the person of Jesus who stood among "sinners" waiting in line to be baptized. And it is this God-Man who too takes each of us by the hand, walking our walk and shouldering all the difficulties and joys we face in this life, as our beloved companion. For me, that is what Jesus' Baptism was about. He's one of us!

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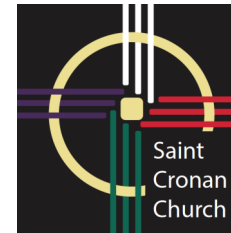

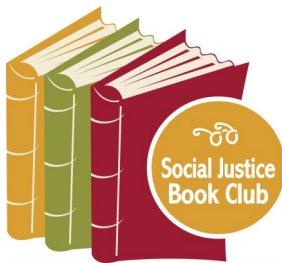
