Pastoral Reflection

26th Sunday in Ordinary Time October 1, 2023

In the Gospel this Sunday, Jesus shares a parable illustrating that it is better to A) resist doing what God asks of us first before changing our mind and doing it than it is to B) claim we will do God's will and then not do so. Paul's words to the Phillipians emphasize the importance of humble service to God.

Both of these scriptures bring to mind the intriguing life of St. Vincent de Paul, whose feast day was September 27th. Vincent grew up in a poor family in France in the late 1500s and joined the priesthood to better his family's fortune. He was not proud of his humble roots; he was disdainful to the point of refusing to welcome his father at his seminary for wearing shabby clothing. He spent most of his young priesthood using his wit and charm to work his way into high society, on his way to a life of comfort and clericalism.

But he changed.

Vincent was summoned to hear a dying peasant's confession, and the peasant's gratitude for absolution touched Vincent to his core. From then on, he committed himself to loving the poor through service to them.

The list of Vincent de Paul's gifts to both the poor and the church runs long. He leveraged his contacts with the wealthy to fund many charitable endeavors, helping and caring for tens of thousands of people. He founded the Congregation of Priests of the Mission (later known as the Vincentians) and, with the help of Louise de Marillac, the Daughters of Charity. He personally ministered to people in prison and ransomed enslaved persons in North Africa.

St. Vincent de Paul challenged us all to practice what we preach when he wrote, "We must love God...But let it be in the work of our bodies, in the sweat of our brows. For very often many acts of love for God, of kindness, of good will, and other similar inclinations and interior practices of a tender heart, although good and very desirable, are yet very suspect when they do not lead to the practice of effective love."

Let us ask God to repeatedly motivate us to offer love to our neighbors, especially the poor among us, and even when it means entering uncomfortable territory. Sources:



October Ministry of the Month: Faith Formation for Children and Adults St. Cronan's Children's Faith Formation is a unique, tailored religious education program for children from Kindergarten-8th Grade. We offer instruction in the Sacraments as well as grade-appropriate classes for all students. Meeting twice per month, the children are instructed in the Catholic Faith with a Social Justice perspective. Parents receive supplemental materials to instruct children in their homes, creating a family religious culture that is designed to teach the Children to live their faith. Emphasis on what we believe, how we worship, how we live and how we pray occurs throughout all of the classes. We also strive to build community among the students and adults by participating in social justice activities. Children and parents meet the first and third Sundays of the month after 10:00 Mass.

Adult Faith Formation takes place through small group and large group offerings as well as resources provided for individual study through Cronantalk. Current small groups include Turtles women's reading group, adult reading group, Contemplative prayer group, and women's prayer group. We have annual men's and women's retreats. Some future offerings will include a social justice concert, Issues and Inspirations (talks occurring after 10:00 Mass), Bible Study, and some Adult Faith on Tap discussions.
