Pastoral Reflection 28th Sunday of Ordinary Time October 12, 2025

The Gospel this week from Luke is the familiar story of the 10 lepers that are cured by Jesus. But there is a deeper meaning. The Greek literally means "to be made well" or "saved". So there isn't just a cure. There is a complete transformation through the saving grace of God. Every aspect of this man's life was touched and made new. We are not just dealing with a physical cure, rather the healing goes deep into the the very core of his being.

By the "healing" of the Samaritan and also the healing of Naaman, a Gentile, we see that love is not meant to be insular or narrow. It is meant to be outward and like the universe ever expanding. Love is meant not to just be an exchange among family and/or friends. Love is to reach all.

We have an ailing individual named Lance Shockley who is scheduled for execution this week. Besides the questions that surround the evidence or lack thereof, how do we love someone on death-row? Too many governors, judges, juries etc. say that's the law! I can't see Jesus uttering those words. As Pope Leo just said, "If you are for the death penalty then you are not Pro-Life". For many there are serious questions concerning his guilt. It is insane to kill someone, period. But to chance the fact that he may be innocent and kill him anyone is barbaric. Please love Lance Shockley! Let our Catholic Governor know that Catholics don't kill people!

I had the opportunity to testify on behalf of a man who committed three murders and one was a 10 year old boy. My testimony was during the penalty phase. My plea was

for life in prison instead of the "needle". I referenced the attempted assassination of Pope John Paul. I said that even though someone tried to take his life the Pope still valued the gunman's life. He visited him in prison. I knew the person who committed the three murders. He had been in our grade school and I visited him for seven years while he was awaiting trial. I testified that I value his life and that his extremely large family value his life. It was a bench trial and the judge gave the penalty of life in prison! Praise God!

Last year I was present for his Confirmation in the Potosi Correctional Facility. Now he is the sacristan for Mass and he assists in the OCIA program for those interested in becoming Catholic. He also trains service dogs. What a waste if he had been executed.
