Reflection October 20, 2024 29th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Is 53:10-11

If he gives his life as an offering for sin.... through his suffering, my servant shall justify many,

and their guilt he shall bear.

Heb 4:14-16

Brothers and sisters:

Since we have a great high priest who has passed through the heavens,

Jesus, the Son of God,

let us hold fast to our confession.

For we do not have a high priest

who is unable to sympathize with our weaknesses,

but one who has similarly been tested in every way,

yet without sin.

So let us confidently approach the throne of grace

to receive mercy and to find grace for timely help.

Ever since the time of Moses and Aaron, until the second temple's destruction in 70 C.E., the High Priest acted as mediator between God and the people of Israel. As intercessor, the High Priest stood as the people's representative before God, and in offering animal sacrifices produced the means of atonement.

Literally, the ritual looked like this: on the Day of Atonement (Yom Kippur) the High Priest entered the Holy of Holies in the Temple and symbolically cleansed the space by sprinkling the blood of sacrificial animals on the mercy seat of the Ark of the Covenant. This sprinkling effectively "covered" the sins of the people. Coincidentally, only the High Priest was allowed to enter this most sacred space filled with God's presence, to perform this extremely sacred ritual. Today, even without this particular ritual, Yom Kippur is considered the holiest day of the year for practicing Jews. This act of atonement, of "covering" the sins, was considered a really big deal and the High Priest kind of an unapproachable (i.e., holier than thou).

The old covenant with its mandatory sacrifice is contrasted with the new law in Paul's letter to the Hebrews, written to encourage Jewish Christians to maintain their faith in Jesus Christ. In it, they were urged not to return to their former ways, when they were caught up in the Law and in guilt for never being quite good enough. Sound familiar? Paul speaks of Jesus as our High Priest, no longer the super holy "unapproachable," but empathetic with our human weakness, having been tempted and tested himself, just like us. Because of Jesus, having already entered "the throne of grace," by his death and resurrection, we can now approach the same throne with confidence. That is, we are free, in spite of our shortcomings and failures, to enter the Holy of Holies, confident of absolution due to his gift to us.


