Pastoral Reflection

29th Sunday in Ordinary Time October 22, 2023

Gospel: Mt 22:15-21

The Pharisees went off and plotted how they might entrap Jesus in speech. They sent their disciples to him, with the Herodians, saying,

"Teacher, we know that you are a truthful man and that you teach the way of God in accordance with the truth. And you are not concerned with anyone's opinion, for you do not regard a person's status. Tell us, then, what is your opinion:

Is it lawful to pay the census tax to Caesar or not?" Knowing their malice, Jesus said,

"Why are you testing me, you hypocrites? Show me the coin that pays the census tax." Then they handed him the Roman coin. He said to them, "Whose image is this and whose inscription?" They replied, "Caesar's." At that he said to them,

"Then repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God."

Ah, the dance of Jesus!

In today's gospel the Pharisees wanted so badly to trap Jesus and make him a public humiliation, proving to everyone that he was a fraud. But Jesus easily caught on and foiled the trap they had set for him.

The Pharisees knew well that Jesus was not a rule follower in the sense of fundamentalist orthodox Jews, where the letter of the law needed to be adhered to in order to be of good standing. But in this trap the Pharisees knew that Jesus was not keen on paying the census tax (nor were his followers) as it supported the empire's ongoing oppression. The Pharisees also knew that if he spoke out against paying tribute to Caesar he could get into legal trouble. And of course that's exactly what they were hoping for. On the other hand, if Jesus easily agreed to conform to the onerous rule, by paying the tax, he would appear hypocritical of his mission, a transcendent one rising above earthly politics.

But he cleverly worked around this dilemma. Although his heart was not that of a legalist, emulating a human being (Tiberius Caesar) who was broadly considered to be the "Son of God" (like all Roman emperors since the death of Julius Caesar in 44 BCE), Jesus knew he walked a fine line. So he made the distinction between the realm of Caesar (a humanly devised concept) and the realm of God (the actual Divine).

So when the Pharisees asked him, "Is it lawful to pay the census tax to Caesar or not?" Jesus refused to be caught in their sinister web, putting the onus back on them. Regarding the tax, he replied simply, "repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God." i.e., What is humanly devised should follow the human-made rules, having no supreme or eternal consequence. But what is ordained by God should be adhered to with all our hearts and all our souls, because the consequence of doing so is for all time.

In Tuesday's New York Times there was an article about Javier Milei, a far-right libertarian candidate <u>leading the polls in Argentina's presidential election</u> this month.

The article reads,


"In 2020, Mr. Milei, a self-identifying Catholic, called (fellow Argentinian) Pope Francis an 'imbecile' and 'the representative of the Evil One on earth' because he defends 'social justice.' Last year, Mr. Milei said the pope "always stands on the side of evil" because he supports taxes. And last month, in an interview with the former Fox News host Tucker Carlson, Mr. Milei said the pope "has an affinity for murderous communists" and is violating the Ten Commandments."

I'm not certain what exactly was Milei's point but he seems to follow the self-righteous path of the Pharisees in Jesus' time, by attempting to buttonhole one of the holiest and humblest persons on the planet today. In my mind, Francis faces the same unvarnished scrutiny by someone trying to trap and humiliate him as the Pharisees attempted with Jesus.

So what about the rest of us? What is the moral of the story? What is equivalent to taxes rendered to Caesar? And who is Caesar for us? Perhaps our Caesar is the need to conform to outside appearances that make us look good to others. Perhaps it is giving in to the pressure to go the legalistic route without asking any questions about how our complicit actions harm others, when we might have the option to protest or even do civil disobedience in the holy effort to right laws that are wrong.

We are pressured from every direction to adhere to Caesar's ways, whether it is to pay income taxes that unconditionally support the military or to consume uncritically in a consumer culture that pressures us to want and buy more without considering human or environmental costs. Like Jesus, we need to selectively render unto Caesar the things of this world and give the rest to God.
