Pastoral Reflection 30th Sunday of Ordinary Time October 26, 2025

In the next month, our Sunday readings and feasts will awaken in us the prayerful longing so characteristic of Advent, which begins at the end of November.

In one week, on November 2, we will celebrate the Feast of All Souls, a day to pray for our beloved dead. A week later, on November 9, the church will celebrate the Dedication of the Lateran Basilica, the cathedral parish in Rome, often called the Pope's church. This feast symbolically invites us as a parish to pray for the unity and mission of the global church, to which we belong.

In 1925, Pope Pius XI instituted the last Sunday of each liturgical year as the Feast of Christ the King. This was Pius XI's way of inviting the church to pray for our world, increasingly marked by atheism and secularism. Today, the feast is called the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, and on this feast, our church continues to pray for the salvation of the world.

On this Sunday, the 30th Sunday in Ordinary Time, our first reading is from the book of Ecclesiasticus (also known as the Wisdom of Ben Sira). The book is found only in Catholic bibles and was used in the early church for moral instruction. Today, chapter 35 calls for a moral inventory of our solidarity with the poor. Ecclesiasticus says that God is not deaf to the wail of the orphan or the widow and will not delay. As we will sing in the psalm response from Psalm 35, "God hears the cry of the poor."

The two letters of St. Paul to Timothy are pastoral epistles to the leaders of the early church. Paul says in today's passage from 2

Timothy, "I have finished the race; I have kept the faith. A crown of righteousness awaits me," and Paul goes on to remind us that we, too, are called to finish the race with authenticity.

Today's gospel from Luke 18 is a short parable about a Pharisee and a tax collector. Jesus's audience would have considered the Pharisee the good guy and the tax collector the bad guy, but not so in Luke, where the Pharisee hypocritically whitewashes his outward appearance with religious practices, but inside is "full of filth." Meanwhile, the tax collector more authentically prays, "O God, be merciful to me, a sinner."

The scriptures today make us mindful that we are sinners and that God hears the cry of the poor. God, be merciful to each of us, as we pray this Sunday for ourselves and in the Sundays ahead for our beloved dead, our church, and our world.


