#### Reflection November 17, 2024 33rd Sunday in Ordinary Time

It seems fitting that in the wake of the recent

U.S. election we should find ourselves reading today from Mark's "little apocalypse" (generally understood as the whole of Mark 13). Apocalyptic language in scripture is often employed by distressed or oppressed communities to address, in acoded way, political and social realities that are both threatening and dangerous. Apocalyptic is the genre of the oppressed living under constant threat of capricious and malignant power, and it is meant to give hope to people for whom hope has withered and faded.

In breaking open what this word from Mark means for us in this day and age, author, activist and biblical scholar Ched Myers suggests we start by asking: "What does it mean for us to discern the signs of the times today, and to retain hope in the face of so much violence and discouragement?"

The results of this election and the goals of the incoming administration seem directly opposed to every aspect of the hope we as followers of Jesus have for a world that is more just, peaceful, inclusive, compassionate and sustainable. As Mark outlines in the beginning of today's reading, it appears that things will only get darker, will only get worse. And it is tempting to feel powerless, to despair, to become numb, withdraw and to live in denial, to close our eyes.

In unpacking this section of Mark, Myers sees

an invitation for us to enter deeply into the bleakness, the pain and sadness of this dark moment as part and parcel of the agony of Jesus on the cross, to not turn our faces away but to face the brokenness of our world and to move through it. In moving through it, we remember and learn that our hope has never been in the "powers and principalities" of this world, but in the promise of the hidden seed of the reign of God that even now is toiling upward toward life in the deep darkness underground. We are called to foster that hidden seed, even when we do not see it actively blooming and bearing fruit in this moment in history in which we

live. Despite not knowing "that day or hour" when the promised spiritual, social and political transformation of the reign of God will come, we are called to practice a "revolutionary patience" in the dark night of history; to not give up, but to dig down, to root ourselves ever more resolutely in the good news of Jesus.

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
