Pastoral Reflection All Saints Day and All Souls November 2, 2025

The two adjoining feasts of All Saints and All Souls ask us to remember the reality of death. However, the way in which these days challenge us to do so is through remembering first and foremost not death itself, but those people who have died, be they loved ones or canonized saints. The emphasis is continued relationality in, through, and beyond death.

Eastern Orthodox Bishop Kallistos Ware writes, "in determining death's place and in regard to it" we must keep in mind that "death is a separation that is no separation." He quotes Russian writer Iulia de Beausobre who expounds upon this thought, saying, "The Church ... is a meeting-place of persons dead, alive and yet to be born, who, loving one another, come together round the rock of the Altar to proclaim their love of God."

This is part and parcel of the mystery of the Resurrection—that death does not have the final word. Though the separation we feel from our beloved dead is in one sense very real, in another sense it is no separation at all. Our relationship with the dead continues but has changed.

In the midst of this mystery, Ware assures us that the dead pray for the living just as the living pray for the dead, and that we can continue growing together in mutual love. He writes:

"In bitter remorse we are tempted to say to ourselves: 'Too late, too late, the chance has gone forever; there is nothing more to be done.' But we are altogether mistaken, for it is not too late. On the contrary, we can go home this very day, and in our evening prayers we can speak directly to the dead friend from whom we were estranged. Using the same words that we would employ if they were still alive and we were meeting them face to face, we can ask their forgiveness and reaffirm our love. And from that very moment our mutual relationship will be changed. Although we do not see their face or hear their response, although we have not the slightest idea how our words reach them, yet we know in our hearts that we and they have together made a fresh start. It is not too late to begin again."





Poinsettia Fund Raiser: Every Christmas season, St. Cronan-Church sells red, white, and pink poinsettias. This year we are selling them at three price points, by size: (4"-\$10) (6" - \$20) (8" - \$30). The reason we associate poinsettias with Christmas comes from an old Mexican legend. A young girl named Pepita was sad that she didn't have a gift to leave for baby Jesus at Christmas Eve services. Her cousin tried to comfort her and said that Jesus would love any present from her, even the smallest one. With no money to buy a real gift, Pepita picked a bouquet of weeds that she walked past on the way to church. When she got there, she left the weeds at the bottom of the nativity scene. All of a sudden, the weeds transformed into beautiful red flowers. And, from that day on, they became known as "Flores de Noche Buena," or "Flowers of the Holy Night." Poinsettias get their American name from Joel Roberts Poinsett, the first U.S. ambassador to Mexico, who brought them to the states from Mexico in the early 1800s. Christmas poinsettia order forms can be found in the back of Church and online. The last day to order your poinsettias for the Christmas season is November 30. And poinsettias purchased can be picked up after each Mass on December 6 and 7. Ordering these poinsettias from St. Cronan also helps our Church, as it is a fundraiser.
