Fifth Sunday of Ordinary Time February 9, 2025

Is 6:1-8. Ps 138: 1-8. 1Corinth 15:1-11. Luke 5:1-11

As I was visiting in a facility today, I saw an armband on a woman that read, 'TRUST IN THE LORD ALWAYS.' I was so struck by that simple call to faith. Here she is sitting at a table for lunch alone, surrounded by lots of people and yet by herself. That sincere and bold act of faith proclaimed not only for herself but for anyone who might notice that there is something/someone bigger calling to afraid, Can we hear that in our day to day us.

And that's what the readings say to me this week: we are called. Isaiah hear's his call in a vision of mystery and a strange reality being touched and healed by an ember. We are all a bit more aware of the the force of fire these days as we've watched the infernos in California ravish thousands of acres and probably billions of dollars of value in homes, schools and businesses. Rich and poor have seen their goods and lives destroyed. The basic needs of all the people have been for shelter, food and hope. Will they be healed by the embers that have seared them?

Paul acknowledges that it is only by Mystery's grace that he has been freed and renewed to spread the Good News that Jesus preached, healed, suffered, died and rose. Where do we find the grace to proclaim this same good news in our own lives? Last week Justin repeatedly asked the question, "Where do we hear the Spirit?" I find that asking that question repeatedly and with a truly open

heart will give me answers. I share this humbly but last week it gave me the opportunity to help with an unexpected food outreach to our immigrant brothers and sisters. It was so empowering to see the community come together and reach out. There are no words for the unexpected and generous hug that enwrapped me after a delivery.

The "almost" disciples listened to Jesus's advice when he suggested they put their nets out again even when they'd had a totally unsuccessful night fishing. In doing so they had the catch of a lifetime and were told not to be lives? Don't be afraid I am with you. Keeping our eyes focused in hope, gives us that courage to say with heartfelt confidence, "Here I am, God, send me."



St. Cronan Catholic Church Land Acknowledgement

We respectfully acknowledge that the land on which St. Cronan Church now stands is part of the ancestral territory of the Wahzhazhe (Osage), Myaamia (Miami), Illiniwek (Illini), Chikashsha (Chickasaw), Ugahxpa (Quapaw), Sac & Fox, Shawnee, Otoe-Missouria, Baxoje (Ioway), and Kiikaapoi (Kickapoo) tribes. We honor the enduring presence of Native Americans and Indigenous peoples in this region and express our respect for their contributions, both past and present.

On November 10th, 1808, large portions of Missouri and Arkansas, including the land which is now St. Louis City, were seized by the United States Government as part of the Land Cession 67. The Indian Removal Act of 1830, along with subsequent legislation, further contributed to the forced displacement of the Native American and Indigenous peoples who had lived on these lands for generations. Currently, there are no federally recognized Native American tribes with reservation lands in Missouri, though 2019 census data indicates that approximately 454,478 Missouri residents are of Native American/Indigenous descent.

We pay our respects to these Indigenous peoples, who have been stewards of this land for generations. We also acknowledge the historical and ongoing impacts of colonization and missionizing by the Catholic Church, which have profoundly affected the lives and cultures of Indigenous peoples.

We recognize the resilience, strength, and enduring contributions of Native American and Indigenous communities. We commit to understanding and addressing the historical injustices that have occurred through continued learning, dialogue, and action. As members of St. Cronan Church, we seek to foster a spirit of reconciliation, mutual respect, and partnership with all Indigenous peoples. We are dedicated to acknowledging the harm caused by our church's historical role, learning from Native and Indigenous wisdom, and working towards healing and justice.

As we gather on this land, we commit ourselves to ongoing education about its history and the Native Americans and Indigenous peoples who have called it home. We pledge to deepen our understanding, promote reconciliation, and pursue justice, while recognizing the profound connection between people, land, and culture.

Through this land acknowledgment, we aim to remind all who enter our space of the enduring legacies of colonialism, the forced removal of Indigenous peoples, and the missionizing imposed by the Catholic Church. We express our gratitude to the Native and Indigenous stewards of this land, past and present.

We recognize that land acknowledgments are just one step in an ongoing journey toward understanding and healing. We welcome feedback and invite those with lived experiences, particularly from Indigenous communities, to share their perspectives, helping us to deepen our commitment to justice and reconciliation.
