Second Sunday of Easter Divine Mercy Sunday April 27, 2025

Yesterday morning (Easter Monday) I learned the news of Pope Francis' passing. Just as he lived his life so vulnerably in front of us all, in his dying he was quiet, indiscreet and humble, simply slipping away into what was already so much a part of him.

My sister in Seattle asked me, "Weren't you shocked?" I replied, "No, not really. We assumed it was coming." After all, didn't Francis prepare us for what *he knew* was inevitably ahead? Francis lived his life fully and transparently. No secrets kept from us. We could rely on his sincerity and undying love for all. He was bedrock and completely prepared to die, right in front of us. Sort of like Jesus... on the cross, exposed to all.

The timing of Francis' "going home" was interesting, wasn't it? The morning after Easter! As if the resurrection grabbed him too! Apparently he kept a pretty full schedule through the Triduum and Easter itself. What was he thinking?! Perhaps he thought those days were like every other day – those prepared to live life for eternity.

On Easter morning Francis met with Catholic, J.D. Vance. Perhaps that's what finally did him in (just kidding!) The Washington Post reported this about the meeting, just before...

"The pope was about to speak a few words to a crowd of tens of thousands in St. Peter's Square before an archbishop read Francis's final Easter homily. The message decried 'how much contempt is stirred up at times towards the vulnerable, the marginalized and migrants.' *The address also warned against elected officials who 'yield to the logic of fear, which only leads to isolation from others.''*"

Imagine the stamina required on sickly Francis' part to uphold the gospel in the face of the self-assured "attack dog" of Trump.

"Vance, in the days leading up to the

visit, had vehemently defended the Trump administration's aggressive deportation agenda, slamming both the 'illegal migrant invasion 'under President Joe Biden and the 'smug, selfassured b...s...' coming from critics of Trump's deportation policies."

On my good side I try to withhold judgement, but in this case my bad side emerges. I want this person, in the last moments of our saintly Francis' life, to feel the egg dripping slowly and messily down his face....


My sense is that in those final moments of his life, Francis was giving the world a parting gift. He demonstrated that the life and resurrection of Jesus has the last word. Not the wealthiest nation on the planet. Not the egotistical and ostentatious representative of those who despise people who are different, otherly abled, poor and beaten down.

Francis was a man for all. He embraced, at the end, the words of Paul to the Phillipians* in a Lenten reading (that I mistakenly chose for this Sunday, but I find it to apply perfectly to Francis):

"It is not that I have already taken hold of it or have already attained perfect maturity, but I continue my pursuit in hope that I may possess it, since I have indeed been taken possession of by Christ Jesus. Brothers and sisters, I for my part do not consider myself to have taken possession. Just one thing: forgetting what lies behind but straining forward to what lies ahead, I continue my pursuit toward the goal, the prize of God's upward calling, in Christ Jesus." **Philippians 3:8-14**


