# **Pastoral Reflection**

### **Corpus Christi**

Throughout my recent journey through pregnancy, childbirth, and now my first month postpartum, I have been availed of many an opportunity to contemplate the Incarnation and what it means to belong to the Body of Christ.

Rachel Reed's *Reclaiming Childbirth as a Rite of Passage* discusses how women deeply embody the life-death-rebirth cycle inherent to the human condition—the Paschal Mystery. Each month, a menstruating woman's hormonal fluctuations lead her through the initial build of energy and mood at the start of her cycle, through the peak at ovulation, and through the low time of energetic and emotional withdrawal at the end--a sort of emotional death preceding the return of new life at the start of the next month.

Nowhere do women participate more deeply in the truth of Christ's Incarnation and Passion as throughout pregnancy, childbirth, and the postpartum period. We feed another life with our own bodies—first with our blood as the placenta burrows holes into our arteries, and finally, round the clock, every two to three hours, as we breastfeed our babies. (A task which, incidentally, takes about 1,800 hours in one year—roughly the same amount of time as a 40-hour-a-week job with three weeks' vacation.)

Women experience nausea, fatigue, and pain throughout this process, as we give of our very bodies to nurture life. During childbirth, a laboring mother participates in Christ's Passion. As writer Maggie Nelson puts it, "it isn't the pain [of childbirth] that one forgets. It's the touching death part."


Through these experiences, women reverberate the same God-infused nature of relational oneness that we discover anew each week in the Eucharist. In the Gospel today, Jesus states, "For my flesh is true food, and my blood is true drink. Whoever eats my flesh and drinks my blood remains in me and I in him."

We have known that maternal cells migrate into the child's body during pregnancy; science now tells us that fetal cells also migrate to various parts of a woman's body. They are often found in areas of injury where she needs healing and have been found in mothers' bodies decades later.

Mothers give of their bodies so that others may live and simultaneously experience the cellular-level unity therein. Women may indeed be among the best earthly representatives of Christ's Incarnation as they participate bodily in Christ's self-giving love as exemplified in the Eucharist.
