Pastoral Reflection Holy Body & Blood of Christ *June 2, 2024*

What comes to your mind when you hear the words of the Consecration, the words of Jesus from the Last Supper, as seen in our Gospel today?

For me, it signifies yet another mystery, just as last week we contemplated the mystery of the Holy Trinity.

In the mystery of the Body and Blood of Christ, we know that Christ tells us to consume his body and blood in the form of bread and wine "in remembrance of me." He tells us that this is the new covenant, and that by eating his body and blood, we gain eternal life. The

first reading tells us of the Covenant instituted by God with the people of Israel soon after they were freed from Egypt. Moses sprinkles blood on the Altar and on the people, telling them that this is the "blood of the covenant that the most high God has made with you in accordance with all these words of God." The words of God to which Moses refers are the many laws that God has given Moses for his people. If you are at all familiar with the Old Testament, especially the first five books of Moses, you know that God's people had a difficult time keeping this Covenant, and often ended up conquered and enslaved by rival civilizations.

Christ's new covenant, instituted through the Eucharist, tells us that unless we eat of his body and drink of his blood, we will not gain eternal life, and will not have Christ's life within us. That's pretty scary. We need the nourishment of Christ in us to feed our Spirits and keep us as one. One bread, one body. By partaking of Christ's body, we become that body and go forth into the world celebrating Christ within us and sharing Christ with others.

We Catholics believe that the bread and wine are truly transformed into Christ's body and blood in the Eucharistic Celebration of the Mass. Eucharist means "thanksgiving" in Greek. With each Eucharist, we are thanking God for the chance to be one in Christ with everyone who also partakes of the Eucharist, and to bring Christ's love to all in the world. We share our love of God through the Spirit within us, fortified by Christ's tremendous gift to us.

This week, we share in the Mystery of Christ's gift of his own body and blood, and we rejoice in the heavenly sustenance that allows us to fortify ourselves in his grace and become one body, one spirit that we take to the marginalized in our midst. Rejoice in thanksgiving that Jesus gave us his flesh for our life and for the life of the world.



June is gun violence awareness month.

Gun violence devastates individuals, families, and communities in the United States and the St. Louis Archdiocese. As Archbishop Rozanski noted at last summer's Gun Violence Summit, "Gun violence is a human life -- a quality of life -- issue. Those who are threatened by gun violence are not living the fullest potential of their lives." As we celebrate the Solemnity of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ this weekend, we are reminded of the institution of the New Covenant through Jesus Christ, part of which is that He is the final sacrifice, and sacrifices are no longer needed. So may we become aware of the useless sacrifices of human lives every year to gun violence. More than 43,000 Americans are killed with guns, and approximately 76,000 more are shot and wounded. In Missouri, more than 1,300 people die by guns every year. Missouri has the 7th highest rate of gun deaths in the country.
