Pentecost June 8, 2025

Today's readings from Acts and John ought to be read in reverse—John coming first, then Acts. They encapsulate two radically different orientations of the early discipleship community: initially cowering in fear behind locked doors, then testifying boldly in public.

John begins with the apostles hiding and afraid, their leader executed. The likelihood is that they will share his fate. It is a real possibility that the story ends here. And then Jesus appears—wounded but risen—and suddenly there might be a way...

Acts 2 opens with an allusion to "Pentecost," but not the Christian Pentecost; this is the Jewish "Feast of Weeks" when Jews from all over fill the streets of Jerusalem. The reading is rife with imagery that recalls new "beginnings" – the "noise like a strong driving wind" cues us into Genesis when God's spirit swept over the waters like "a mighty wind" – alerting us to some new "creating" action of God in history.

God choosing this ragtag, frightened community also recalls God's choice of the Hebrew slaves in Exodus—a disempowered, marginalized people. Like then, God enters into history on behalf of the powerless, not the powerful.

Most poignantly is the story of the tower of Babel. In the Babel story, the people share a common language, but their ability to understand one another leads to an inflated sense of importance and a desire to show off their power by building a "city and a tower with its top in the sky," a monument to their vanity. Like the pyramids of

Egypt and ziggurats of Babylon, such a monument would be built by the enslaved poor. So God strikes and scatters them by "confusing their languages."


Acts 2 is a reversal of this story. Jews from "every nation" gather, but each hears the emboldened apostles testifying in their own tongue. Understanding—despite language and cultural barriers—is possible. Unlike the Babel story, the apostles' witness is not to their own greatness but to the greatness of God.

A new beginning manifests. The gift of the Spirit isn't the charismatic gift of "speaking in tongues" but the courage to proclaim the gospel message of Jesus despite the threats of the powerful—and the possibility that we'll understand and follow—despite our differences.
