# 16th Sunday of Ordinary Time July 20, 2025

#### How could we sing a song of our God in a foreign land?

Lately these words from Psalm 137 keep playing in my mind. The world we are living in now seems very foreign, even unrecognizable.

The readings for this Sunday liturgy magnify this awareness for me. Abraham and Sarah welcome the three men standing by their tent. The men are invited to wash their feet and then be refreshed with a scrumptious meal. Hospitality is a rule of the desert, and the men are welcomed as fellow travelers on this earth.

The story from the community of Luke also features hospitality. Jesus came to the home of Martha and Mary, unusual for a male guest to be welcomed without another man present in the home. Each woman offers hospitality in her own way. Martha prepares the table, and Mary listens to their guest, like a rabbi in training. Some Scripture scholars suggest this story is a reference to Eucharist in early house churches where women were the hosts for the community that gathered. Martha prepared and served the meal that accompanied the Breaking of the Bread and Sharing of the Cup. Mary prepared the Word, a central ministry for a fledgling religious movement that included many couples and individuals who shared the Word as they did business throughout the Roman Empire.

Martha requests that Jesus ask Mary to join her in her role of service, of diakonia. Jesus recognizes all the work she is doing and affirms her. He recognizes her gifts. He also recognizes Mary's gifts and affirms that she too has chosen a good part (more accurate translation than "better part"). Both of their gifts offer hospitality, eucharist, in the community.

Eucharist means thanksgiving and hospitality. These readings offer a sharp contrast to what is happening in our country today. The racism, cruelty, lack of respect for the humanity of others, the expressed hatred and division – all of these are a jarring contrast to the Scriptures we hear today. How could we sing a song of our God in a foreign land? The challenge is clear. Now is the time to sing our song, each voice different and blending into a common song. Each action, no matter how small, contributes to the hospitality that is core to our living eucharist each day. No matter what the day brings – give us this day our daily bread and our song for this day.
