Ask and You Shall Receive, Costly Grace

Today's Gospel pretty much says it all in terms of the kind of God our God is.

Our God is one of endless empathy and unconditional love, who cares for us as the most generous of parents.

"What parent among you would hand his child a snake who asks for a fish? Or hand the child a scorpion who asks for an egg? If you then, who are wicked, know how to give good gifts to your children, how much more will your parent in heaven give the Holy Spirit to those who ask?"

"...ask and you will receive; seek and you will find; knock and the door will be opened to you.

For everyone who asks, receives; and the one who seeks, finds;

and to the one who knocks, the door will

be opened."

This is what our God offers to us, God's beloved children. But let's not be mistaken. God's offer is not without any cost to us. Rather God invites us to do as God does, to love as God loves, to forgive as God forgives. In doing so, we're invited to take up the cross as Jesus modeled for us. Otherwise to simply ask and receive is just

cheap grace.

In 1937 German theologian, Dietrich Bonhoeffer, wrote the now classic *The Cost of Discipleship*. The book is centered on the Sermon on the Mount, in which Bonhoeffer spells out what he believes it means to follow Christ. The book was published at the same time as the rise of the Nazi regime in Germany. It was against this background that Bonhoeffer's theology of costly discipleship developed, which ultimately led to his death.

According to Bonhoeffer, cheap grace is the preaching of forgiveness without requiring repentance, <u>baptism</u> without church discipline, <u>communion</u> without <u>confession</u>. Cheap grace is grace without <u>discipleship</u>, grace without the cross, grace without Jesus Christ, incarnate. It is simply asking and expecting to receive without doing anything but "praise the Lord!"

Rather, Bonhoeffer compels us to consider living by costly grace. To stand up and be counted as disciples of Christ, who will be known by our actions and our love. The costly kind of love is one of a sacrificial sort. Costly grace confronts us as a gracious call to follow Jesus. It is costly because it compels us to submit to the yoke of Christ and follow him; it is grace because Jesus says: "My yoke is easy and my burden is light."

So, when we ask, may we hope to receive, from our all-loving parent, the grace to accept Christ's "easy" yoke and "light" burden.
