Pastoral Reflection

17th Sunday in Ordinary Time July 30, 2023

Father Jack in his reflection and homily last Sunday provided key information about the interpretation of parables. Jesus uses this form, which is familiar to his listeners, to express a moral or spiritual lesson. Usually he adds a piece to the story that challenges his listeners or leaves them uneasy, even angry.

The Gospel this week follows the pattern from the readings last week – two short parables and a third one that is interpreted. Last week the images used were good seeds growing among weeds, a mustard seed, and leaven. This week the examples are a treasure buried in a field, a pearl of great price, and a net of fish.

The treasure and pearl stories seem straight forward. The kingdom of heaven requires a complete commitment. When one finds this treasure or pearl of great price, the response is to do whatever is necessary to get it.

But wait – the man finding the treasure is a day laborer. It is not his field. What do the law and customs of the time say about ownership and disclosure of this find to his boss? "Finders/keepers" is not viable in a small-community world. How can he use the wealth? People would question how he got it, how he deceived the owner. The man had great joy, but he needed to keep this to himself.

The merchant, a member of the upper class, searched for the pearl of great price. He had great joy in finding it and sold all to obtain it. Listeners at the time – and probably our question too – would

wonder how he could live with all his wealth in the pearl. He would need to sell it for daily living expenses and continuation of his business.


Both of these "finders" also failed to do what was expected. Many similar stories exist in the wisdom tradition of the Jewish people and in other writings of the early centuries of the Common Era. These stories described the finders of wealth as sharing it with others – the poor, the rabbis, the church. For Jesus' listeners this would have been a shocking omission. How could Jesus use these examples as metaphors for the kingdom of God?

The net with the fish is similar to the wheat and weeds from the Gospel last week. Not everyone will be perfect, or even righteous, now. At the end of the age, messengers of God will separate the wicked from the righteous. What is required now is patience and recognition that God loves everyone, indeed all of creation. Our role is not to decide who is worthy and who is not. God can and will handle that.

So what do we learn about the "kingdom of God" in these parables? Some possibilities: it is not for safekeeping; we are called to share it; some less than desirable characters can image it — metaphor describes similarities and dissimilarities; we can't box it in or control it—the kingdom of God will often surprise us.

What other "wisdom" can you find in these parables?


