18th Sunday of Ordinary Time August 3, 2025

There is an apocryphal quote, attributed to various modern philosophers, that has been circulating widely these days. It goes like this: "It is easier for us to imagine the end of the world than to imagine the end of capitalism."

The Catholic Church has been markedly consistent in its critique of unfettered capitalism, with Pope Leo XIII's encyclical Rerum Novarum being a landmark document in this tradition. Today's readings show that the basis for this stance is firmly embedded in scripture. The first reading explores the psychological and spiritual impact of materialism as well as the plight of the laborer, and the Gospel reading introduces a key challenge to our current version of capitalism: "to whom will [our riches] belong" when we have shuffled off this mortal coil?

In Centesimus Annus, Pope John Paul II's encyclical published on the centennial of Rerum Novarum, he speaks of the universal destination of all goods. This principle is rooted in the reality of Creation itself—that all things come from God—and hearkens back to Thomas Aquinas, who wrote: "The temporal goods which God grants us are ours as to the ownership but as to the use of them, they belong not to us alone but also to others as we are able to [help them] out of what we have over and above our needs."

What we have, we have by the grace of God alone. We all have the right to provide for ourselves and to see that we are sheltered, clothed, and fed. But what we have above and beyond that we owe to others. Once our needs are met, we have a responsibility to the community.

After all, as the old adage goes, we can't take it with us. May we resist the temptation of greed and work toward implementing social and economic systems that prioritize the dignity of all persons and that honor the responsibilities we have to one another and to Creation itself.


