Reflection September 15, 2024 24th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Isaiah 50:4-9 Psalm 116:1-9 James 2:14-18 Mark 8:27-35

We usually skip over the entrance antiphon by allowing our music to provide the beginning to our Sunday gathering. But today's prayer from Sirach 36:18 caught my attention; "Give peace. O God to those who wait for you, that your prophets be true. Hear the prayers of your servant, and of your people Israel." So we are praying for Isaiah (first reading) whom I think had a lot of courage and all the prophets in our own time, of whom there are many. "Give peace....and hear the prayers of your people Israel." While the unrest occurring in the Middle East may not be touching us personally how tragic the day to day lives are for those who fear the next bomb, or have no idea from where the next meal will come from or whether their child will now be sickened with polio. I have a friend from college who has lived in Israel since the mid 70's. She and her husband went there to share the "Good News." Our communication has been fractured due to time and distance and I think of her often. Do they know peace now?

Jesus makes it very clear that following him is not an easy road. He tells us unequivocally that there are going to be many losses. As I am growing older the losses of family, friends and stability seem to be multiplying. It's easy to lose hope if my faith is not constantly being nurtured and renewed. What keeps your hope alive? What renews your faith? Be with me God as I long to know you better.


