## Pastoral Reflection 26th Sunday of Ordinary Time September 28, 2025

This 26th Sunday in Ordinary Time, Jesus offers the parable of the comfortably living rich man and the poor suffering man, Lazarus, who is outside the rich man's home. Though they are so close physically, the rich man, who is not even given a name here, is blind to Lazarus' wounds, deaf to Lazarus' cries, and ignorant of his hunger.

It is easy for me to judge the rich man for his self-centeredness and lack of concern for others, thinking that if I had someone like Lazarus outside my door, of course I would share and give him comfort.

### But I could ask myself:

Do I perhaps choose to live somewhere that this is very improbable to happen?

Do I choose to spend time with people and at places that don't involve those who are unwell and live much less comfortably than me?

Do I see people's wounds by visiting those who are sick, ill, or injured?

Do I go to the hungry, or hurt, and acknowledge their suffering?

Jesus makes it clear that the distance we create in this life between us and suffering will be inverted when we die. That "the last will be first and the first will be last."

When rich man dies, he finds himself burn-

ing in pain while Lazarus is embraced and finds love. Though most of Jesus' teachings point to mercy, this parable denies the rich man the chance to have his living family be warned.

What do we make of this?

This must be an absolute priority of Jesus, that we heed the call to be in relationship to those suffering, to be close to them, and to tend to them. How similar this is to the parable of the sheep and the goats. The mercy we give is the mercy we will receive.

We are called to close the chasms between our complacency and the anguish that surrounds us. We must stretch our hands out, give away our bread, sharing the richness of the Eucharist with which we find ourselves blest.
