Reflection September 29, 2024 26th Sunday in Ordinary Time

There is a pretty obvious pattern connecting today's first reading from Numbers and the gospel reading from Mark. In both readings, people who are "nonsanctioned" are undertaking work that the followers of both Moses and Jesus see as falling under their special purview. They report these "unofficial" people to Moses and Jesus, signaling their indignance and their expectation that Moses and Jesus will agree that such work need "cease and desist." In Joshua's case to Moses, he demands that Moses stop Eldad and Medad from prophesying; while John seems to take pride in telling Jesus how he and the other disciples took the initiative in preventing this "outsider" from continuing to drive out demons in Jesus' name. Far from sharing their followers' concerns about who is allowed to do what, Moses and Jesus find no issue and take no offense; they celebrate the fact that such work is being done despite the lack of credentials.

The lesson is simple: Our God will not be constrained by the rules or expectations we set for her. Where we want to delineate boundaries, God exceeds them. Where we want to set limitations, God blows right past them. Where we want to define a set order for who things work,

God reserves the right to be as wild as she wants to be, conferring on whoever she pleases a spirit which animates and enlivens and is an authority unto itself.

Such passages leave vacant and fatuous our own demand for good order, our strict adherence to tradition, our narrow expectation that things proceed according to our own rules and rubrics! God resists any lines of demarcation we set, especially where it concerns the work of the spirit. The invitation for us is to celebrate whomever is undertaking the work of the gospel—whether they have the right credentials or not—and not to position ourselves as gatekeepers, nor to worry about others stealing our thunder.

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
