Pastoral Reflection Twenty-Third Sunday in Ordinary Time recently. When I was hungry, thirsty, a Feast of St. Teresa of Calcutta September 7, 2025

Jesus's teachings today are challenging for me. I sing out, "I want to be holy just like vou." And I don't want to be estranged from my family. His teaching would have shocked his listeners. They lived in an honor/shame society where family was primary. Their whole lives revolved around family and bringing honor to your family was most important.

Scripture scholars say that "hate" is a mistranslation. "To prefer" more accurately communicates Jesus's intent. The New Testament scholar Gerhard Lohfink writes. "(Jesus) demands of his listeners an ultimate decision for the reign of God, and that Then with God, "our light will break forth necessarily leads to divisions: in fact, it causes divisions that tend into the most intimate social relationships, into the house, the community of the extended family." Tony DeMello SJ attributes this conflict to false perceptions. We have been taught by our families and by our culture to value a "nightmare," specifically our belief that in order to be happy, we and our family have to be esteemed. Jesus is awakening people to the truth that we must not allow such attachment to take the place of what is truly most sacred: our relationship with God, & compassionate love for all God's people.

St. Teeresa of Calcutta lived this truth. The Gospel chosen for her feast is the blueprint for living compassionately, the blueprint for discipleship. She did this in a society with a caste system where some people are considered more valuable than others. Fr.

Jack preached on this Matthew 25 gospel stranger, naked, in prison, sick you gave me what I needed. The tent is expanded. Isaiah shows the same path of care emphasizing that this is justice rather than charity.

Jesus is calling us to be courageous now. Acting for God's Reign puts us in conflict with this administration and those who support them, perhaps even family. This administration violently rejects the poor & marginalized through unjust laws & funding cuts increasing the suffering, collapsing the tent. We are called to hold up the tent. We are not alone. Isaiah reminds us that God guides us, strengthens us. St. Teresa reminds us that we do not need to do great things, but small things with great love. like the dawn," being a beacon of God's healing light and love in these dark times.
